RECTOR'S REPORT

Having suggested to church leaders and committee chairs that annual reports can be distilled to two paragraphs, I'm struggling! The list of people to thank fills two pages. And so instead of a comprehensive report, I share the year's first and final moments.

On New Year's morning our congregations borrowed from the Methodist Covenant Service crafted by John Wesley in 1755. As your priest and pastor, I bid you to remember God's goodness and grace and to commit yourselves in return to God. "Christ has many services to be done: some are easy, others are difficult; some bring honor, others bring reproach; some are suitable to our natural inclinations and material interests, others are contrary to both; in some we may please Christ and please ourselves; in others we cannot please Christ except by denying ourselves." Those who arrived at church expecting light fare on New Year's Day soon realized that they were being served a stout brew! You responded with this corporate prayer to God: "I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will; put me to doing, put me to suffering; let me be employed for you or laid aside for you; let me be full, let me be empty, let me have all things, let me have nothing; I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal." This is both a surrender to, and a trust in, God. It's a daring, even dangerous, prayer. And I'm pleased to report that what transpired at St. Andrew's Church in 2017 testifies to your devotion and discipleship — the covenant prayer was not just spoken with our lips but made manifest in our lives.

On 31 December 2017 forty-one people experienced God's grace at the summit of Sunapee in the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Not one of you was there. That's an important point because it testifies to our transformation into a mission-shaped church that lives not for itself but for others. That's good news for El Hogar students in Honduras, for Dr. Moise Faisson and her patients in Haiti, for inner city kids in Boston, and for Thrift Store customers, Friendly Kitchen frequenters, and folks in Newport. Good News for them, and for us.

CURATE'S REPORT

As this report is published, you've already sent your former curate on her way, and a new year has begun for the Church of St. Andrew. Thinking back on 2017, I'm particularly grateful for St. Andrews' continuing engagement with the work and worship centered at Epiphany Newport. Thank you to those who volunteer with 4H and UpBeat, and who join in the Saturday evening service. Particular thanks to the folks who pitched in with the renovation of Epiphany's worship space. I pray that the connection between Epiphany and St. Andrews continues to deepen.

Other highlights? We launched an Education for Ministry (EfM) group, and completed a year's worth of readings, discussions, and ponderings. I presided at the Mountaintop Mass exactly once, taking the chairlift up Mt Sunapee, and back down again afterwards. (I know there are folks among you who are disappointed that you didn't get me back on skis while I was your curate.) We had a vestry retreat that produced a Mission Action Plan complete with measurable actions and goals. The parish prayer list is now in Marni Eaton's able care. I was grateful for the change in worship schedules that did away with hurrying off to Newport most Sundays for a 10 am service there. It was a joy to be more present to the 10 am congregation in New London these last few months.

Mostly, though, as I review my 2017 calendar, what emerges is a picture of a healthy parish being a parish: worshipping, day in and day out; funerals and baptisms; coffee hours and craft

groups, the parish hall full of toddlers playing or seniors singing... or one of the most collegial and effective vestries I've been a part of meeting to guide this remarkable church.

That's the story of 2017 I hold up to you, a glimpse of God's kingdom: gathering to pray and praise God, to eat and to play and to learn to follow Jesus as we do; to enjoy each other's company, to care for each other, for our neighbors, and for creation—and to be honest when we fall short, and ask forgiveness of God and each other.

And thank you for the beginning you gave me in my life as priest and pastor. My time with you was a gift and a blessing. You all remain in my prayers, and I am so eager to see where the Spirit leads you next. Kelly+

It has been our pleasure to serve. As Becky steps down, we welcome Marni Eaton as our new warden and look forward to another exciting year at St. Andrew's as we all continue *learning to follow Jesus in the way of love!*

We were able to establish a financial reserve of 50K which is earning a healthy return in the Diocesan Investment fund at Bank of America.

We begin 2018 in a strong financial position thanks to the support of our members, and the sound advice of our vestry & finance committee.

Jennifer Giles, soprano, leads *a capella* singing at the 8am Eucharist. She and Sally Asher lead the *Music and Memory* program on Wednesday mornings.

The Parish Choir also participates in the annual cycle of Ecumenical Services hosted by four of churches in New London. On Ash Wednesday we worship at Our Lady of Fatima. The Passion according to St. John was read at St. Andrew's on Good Friday with special music for the choirs and Nicole Densmore, flute, composed by David Almond. In September, the Parish Choir sang in the Service of Remembrance at Kearsarge Community Presbyterian Church and participated in the annual Service of Lessons and Carols at First Baptist Church in December.

At Christmas, Holy Week, Easter and Pentecost the Choir provides special music. In October, we celebrated the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. The choir, Nicole, and the congregation joined in a festival setting of Psalm 46 by contemporary American composer, K. Lee Scott. This extended anthem incorporated Martin Luther's hymn, "A mighty Fortress". On Christmas Eve, the Choir and recorder players Helen Wickham and Joan Ebbeson performed the *Christmas Cantata* by Vincent Luebeck.

Nicole and David continue to collaborate on the music for Eucharist at 10am. They have premiered several new pieces for flute and piano or organ this year. They regularly support the hymn singing with flute descants. We are blessed to have Nicole with us.

ST ANDREW'S YOUTH MUSIC

Each week the children learn a variety of muusic to share at the 10am All-age Eucharist on the first Sunday of each month. These children meet briefly before Sunday school, as well as for a full session on the last Sunday of each month and present a song to the congregation.

We drew many new families from New London and the surrounding towns to our church through their children's participation in music.

In August, St. Andrew's sponsored a special summer music program for young singers in the Lake Sunapee area. During this vibrant week-long day camp, Alison Adam, of the Iona Community, taught us 30 new multi-cultural songs. Alison shared her vision of equipping children *and* adults with musical skills to help enable them to thrive in life and to cope with the pressures of this world through song. Our little band of musicians, Susan Cancio-Bello from Epiphany, Newport, Jennifer Giles, Nicole, and David worked beside Alison Adam in a wonderful week of singing, learning, and devotion.

The children have had many personal successes in the *UpBeat* program. For some of them, this is their first opportunity to step up and perform in front of a group. They are learning how to share the light of love and tolerance through singing, bringing this message out into the world. This is right in line with the purpose of *UpBeat*: to help children flourish – musically, socially, emotionally and spiritually.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The generosity of our parishioners, old and new, shone through once again in our 2018 stewardship campaign. Of the 157 pledges made by December 31 more than half were for higher amounts than the previous year. New members made their support felt with 17 pledges. Thus far, the campaign has raised \$383,738, or an average of \$2,468 per pledge.

Even so, we are still shy of our \$405,000 goal, mainly because there were 14 fewer pledgers this year than last. The shortfall is due mostly to members who are deceased or have moved away.

We have many to thank for their help with the stewardship campaign, starting with outgoing cochairs Rink and Nonie Reynders, who provided valuable advice born of experience. Bruce Avery tracked the progress of the campaign and offered wise guidance, Shelly Boucher was a willing and able driving force in the office and Gail Goddard, Richard Haines and Charlie Tirrell were gracious in sharing their thoughts on stewardship in Ministry Moments at the 8 and 10 am services. Throughout the campaign Jay and Kelly were steadfast in their support. Thank you all.

First and foremost, though, the campaign reflected your recognition and appreciation of God's bounteous gifts to us and your gratitude for His benevolence. As a tangible expression of faith your giving will help to sustain our parish for the coming year, expand our outreach and support the missions and ministries that make St. Andrew's so special. All those whose lives will be touched by these missions and ministries join us in thanking you for your generous giving.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Our 2017-2018 Sunday-school year began on September 10 when we learned about the "Unforgiving Servant." We are still using our Whirl curriculum, with materials that are lectionary-based, relevant for all ages, and help us learn to follow Jesus in our daily lives and address the questions and challenges of living out our faith. It is helpful to engage with the same topics in Sunday School as the adults address in church services.

Sunday School classes meet on the second, third, and, in April only, the fourth Sunday of the month through June. When Sunday School is in session, children typically leave the worship service at the end of the Gloria or first hymn and proceed downstairs where they sing with Nicole then join in the Collect before going to their respective Sunday-school classes. The younger group is composed of children in kindergarten through third grade, while the older group includes children from fourth grade up and any children not yet confirmed. We have excellent, experienced teachers on board for both groups. Both teachers and shepherds have completed or are in the process of completing the required Safe Church training. The children in 7th and 8th grades who are not yet confirmed are encouraged to join the older class or help out with the younger children as "shepherds-in- training." Children in preschool and younger go to the Nursery where care is available at both the 8am and 10am services.

On the fourth (or fifth) Sundays of the month, Nicole Densmore, our Director of Youth Music, rehearses with the children in preparation for the music/singing that is part of the all-age worship on the first Sunday of each month. She is an extraordinarily gifted teacher, musician, and singer and works her magic with the children whenever they practice or perform. Nicole also directs the Upbeat Youth choir; members rehearse weekly and lead us in song at our Advent and Christmas services.

The children enjoyed the Whirl Advent and Christmas curriculum and participated enthusiastically in our Epiphany pageant on January 7th. We will continue with the rest of the Epiphany materials through February 11th then move into studies related to Lent and Easter.

FAITH ADVENTURES

For our 2016-2017 gatherings, our Faith Adventures youth group joined with the youth group at the First Baptist Church (FBC). We alternated between St. Andrew's and FBC for our meeting venues (12:15-2:15 on the 3rd Sunday of the month), bringing together a total of about 16-20 kids at each meeting.

This past year, our youth groups were focused on raising awareness and funds to benefit refugees who are in crisis. This was a process for these junior high students: they participated in experiential exercises and watched films to help them better understand what refugees are suffering all over the world; on March 11th and 12th, youth group members and others participated in a walk through town and a sleep-over sponsored by church members and others to raise community awareness and funds (a total of close to \$7,000!); they held a bake sale where they earned over \$400; they then met to determine which organizations they wanted to support with the money they earned and what percentage would go to each one; next, they spoke to the congregations during our Sunday services to thank their supporters and to educate them on the services provided by the organizations they had chosen (Fresh Start Farms, Doctors Without Borders, Save the Children, and the International Rescue Committee); finally, they volunteered at Fresh Start Farms, a local organization that provides opportunities to refugees in New Hampshire. We are very proud of the dedication and effort displayed by our young people; they give us all hope in a very troubled world.

Our 2017-2018 Faith Adventures group, which includes junior-high students from the First Baptist Church led by Steve and Nancy Allenby, is focused on service in the community. We typically meet at St. Andrew's once a month from 12:15-2:15 pm, although there are other meeting times to include community service projects, a movie afternoon, a parent dinner, and a picnic at the end of the year. There are about 14 junior high students who attend regularly.

This fall, our junior-high students from St. Andrew's kicked off the year with a camping/outdoor trip for two nights at Billings cabin located at the foot of Mount Madison in the Presidential Range with incredible hiking just outside the door. Our focus was on reverence for God's creation and lots of hiking — all the way to the top of Mt. Madison and back!

In October, we met as a whole group, shared a short bible study, carved pumpkins (we even had drills!), enjoyed donuts and cider, and took the kids' masterpieces to the residents at Bittersweet to add to their Halloween decorations.

During our November meeting, our youth groups pitched in to assemble Thanksgiving baskets for those in need and write notes to go with them. We considered our blessings and ways we can show our thanks by using our gifts to serve others.

For the rest of the year, our youth group will engage in a variety of activities that will provide opportunities to have a lot of fun and serve our local communities. We look forward to sharing great times together, growing and applying our faith as we follow Jesus, and making a difference in the lives of others.

HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH GROUP

THRIFT SHOP

This was a very interesting year for the St. Andrew's Thrift Shop. The profit from the shop is donated to St. Andrew's Church. This year the amount was \$13,000. Local outreach organizations received a total of \$1,800. We came close to the projected amount but fell a bit short. We were forced to close more often than usual for bad weather. We continued our brown bag sale all summer which may have lowered our profits a bit, but it did succeed in moving out most of our lightweight clothing to make room for fall and winter clothes.

We donated dozens of bags of summer clothes to Edward Kanu's ministry in Sierra Leone with an estimated value of \$2,000. We assist Wish List NH with clothes in emergency situations for local families, maybe \$100. We donated several coats to Sotherby's annual coat collection with a possible value of \$200, and we distribute extra items to Goodwill which is difficult to itemize.

Our faithful volunteers keep the shop open six days a week, with the help of several reliable substitutes. We find that our inventory has improved and increased during 2017, giving us the ability to offer quality clothing and household goods at very reasonable prices.

We chose to make cash donations to area outreach organizations such as KLS Food Pantry, LSRVNA, and the school nurses' Health Emergency Fund in four area schools.

Our newest project is to interest Colby Sawyer students in shopping at St. Andrew's Thrift Shop. We posted notices in school buildings and encouraged students to pass the word to their friends. This is working, as more and more students are shopping here. We offer them a 10% discount, and we have enjoyed meeting these delightful shoppers and giving them a little break.
