ST. ANDREW'S July—August 2022

Our vestry retreat began with this question:
"Reflecting on your experience of St. Andrew's,
when have you felt most alive, most involved, most
spiritually touched or most excited?" Divided into pairs, we went on to
ask each other, "What do you value deeply about St. Andrew's, what is
the single most important thing that our church has contributed to your
life?" And having considered the past and present, the final question
was about the future: "If God gave you three wishes for your church,
what would they be?"

Working in pairs, small groups and all together, with time in between for prayerful reflection on our own, we listened, synthesized, strategized and imagined until we identified several priorities and goals (which we'll be ready to share by summer's end after a bit more refinement). Thanks in large part to Susan Schweizer's facilitation, our retreat was exceptionally fruitful. It was also exhausting. And as our wardens suggest in their article (*see page 6*), it was a joyful experience.

Twenty-four hours before the vestry gathered at Karen Zurheide's home, we celebrated Brooks' baptism at our 10 o'clock Eucharist. In Christian tradition joy is associated with gratitude, childlike delight, simplicity and purity of heart, and all of these were abundantly evident on Sunday morning.

That word "joy" also describes our Messy Church celebration of Pentecost five days after our retreat. According to the Bible, the coming of the Holy Spirit so infused the first followers of Jesus with joy that observers suspected them of being drunk on new wine (Acts 2.12). Across all ages and in each element of Messy Church — the welcome, the activities in the parish hall, the celebration in the sanctuary, and the shared meal on our patio — there was abundant joy (*see p. 3*).

"Alleluia," the great cry of joy, is our special song from Easter to Pentecost. The Psalms and the book of Isaiah speak not just of human rejoicing; trees, mountains, heaven and earth, and all creation sings (Ps 66.1, 96.12; Is 49.13, 55.12). That joy is something that sixty youngsters from some of Boston's toughest neighborhoods will have a chance to experience on 19-20 July and 2-3 August when we host them for outdoor adventures (see p. 9).

When we sing cascades of Alleluias on Easter Sunday, we do so after sharing in the anguish of Jesus's last days — betrayal, abandonment, suffering, cries and the awful silence of the cross. Christian joy is not self-satisfied contentment; it is more akin to the peace "that passes all understanding" (Phil 4.7). Our joy can live in the midst of difficulty, pain, sorrow, polarization, persecution and even death.



# Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 31 July Rising Senior at Voorhees University

The July recipient of our Last Sunday Outreach Offering is a rising senior at Voorhees University, one of The Episcopal Church's two Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Located in rural Denmark, South Carolina, Voorhees has long been a higher education choice for students who are the first in their family to attend college. The first HBCU to be founded by a woman — Elizabeth Wright, in 1897 — Voorhees has recently added graduate programs and become Voorhees University.

The current media is replete with stories of college student debt; many of us have family and friends who are still paying off

student loans years after graduation. Because 99% of Voorhees' students receive financial aid and beginning salaries in rural South Carolina are low, our offering will help a rising senior, already accomplished academically, go forth into the world with a smaller economic burden. The acknowledgement from last year's senior who received our support was deeply heartfelt. Our generosity indeed made a difference in that young life. We hope to do so again this year!

<u>The Outreach Commission</u> meets in person on the first Thursday of even-numbered months to receive and consider suggestions for our *Last Sunday* offering. We have agreed that our efforts should be focused on humanitarian needs, both domestic and international; and we welcome suggestions from parishioners. At our meetings we discuss potential recipients and decide who among us will do the required research and the writing.

# Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 28 August American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza, Palestine


The very small land (25 miles long and 3.7 to 7.5 miles wide) of Gaza, Palestine — bordered by the Mediterranean Sea to the west, Egypt to the south, and Israel to the east and north — is a densely populated home to 2.1 million people who are blockaded by both Egypt and Israel. Its impoverished residents basically captives there, "the Strip" suffers from more than 50% unemployment, lack of reliably clean water and only intermittent electricity service.

It's been over a year since the 11 days of war between Gaza and Israel in May 2021 that killed 256 Gazans, along with damaging or destroying schools, businesses, clinics/hospitals, mosques, basic utilities, and countless residences, displacing thousands. Addressing recovery from that conflict, Suhaila Tarazi, director of Gaza's Ahli Arab Hospital, has said, "Nothing has happened, nothing has been rebuilt. There are huge rubble piles that used to be buildings, and streets are still impassable. Those who lost homes have moved in with their families. Now you see 20 people living in three rooms."

To help it meet the healthcare needs of people living in these difficult conditions, Ahli Arab Hospital, a mission of the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem (AFEDJ), is the designated recipient of our Last Sunday outreach offering for August. "A nonpolitical, nonsectarian 501 (c)3 organization, AFEDJ is dedicated to raising financial support for schools, hospitals and centers for children with disabilities in Palestine, Israel, Jordan and Lebanon. These institutions serve everyone, irrespective of their religion, ethnicity or ability to pay. . . . The Christian values of equity, justice and respect for the dignity of all are at the heart of our efforts." (Pilgrims to the Holy Land from St. Andrew's in 2018 visited an AFEDJ institution in Jordan, which left a very positive impression.)

We have contributed to this work in the past. Marking the one-year anniversary of last year's war in Gaza, AFEDJ has asked Episcopalians across the church to demonstrate to the remarkable leaders of Ahli Arab Hospital that they are not forgotten. Living conditions in Gaza are still appalling, and sadly hundreds of thousands of children are living in extreme poverty and suffering from the trauma of war. But Ahli Arab Hospital and its dedicated director (one of few Gazans who could leave, as she holds a U.S. passport) are still there, embodying God's love and healing each day.

Through Ahli Arab Hospital, our giving will make a difference to people in Gaza facing incredibly challenging circumstances of daily living, compounded by their medical needs. Please help as you are able, knowing that your gift will be matched by our generous anonymous donors.



## Wardens' Words

#### Retreating to Move Forward

Your Vestry and Rector were on retreat together recently. No, not at some exotic upscale location with fancy beverages being served on silver platters, but at a home in New London for a full day together reflecting on what is valuable to us about St. Andrew's and what dreams we have for our shared parish. We used a method called appreciative inquiry to tease out and then consolidate our thoughts. This included carefully listening to each other—which was also a great opportunity to get better acquainted. Susan Schweizer, a professional mediator, generously gave her time in planning the retreat program with Pastor Jay and the two of us Wardens, and in very ably facilitating our work that day.

In coming weeks, after a bit more time among ourselves to discuss the so-whats and next steps, you'll be hearing details about what and how it all came out. No big surprises! Nothing mysterious, but yet we believe we have settled on important organizing concepts that will provide greater focus for the congregation's future direction and the actions that will help move us forward.

Besides the six key goals that emerged, there was overarching reporting on our significant appreciation of worship at St. Andrew's, with all its elements: liturgy, music, sermons and special rites (such as the occasional baptism). While some aspects of worship are of more importance to one person than to others, we agree that our worship is moving and meaningful. Our Rector Jay is, of course, a big part of this. We are fortunate to enjoy his leadership, including in worship. Our current music staff, Will and Nicole, as well as those who have preceded them in recent years, enhance our worship beyond measure. Again, we are blessed.

And overall, an exciting word emerged: JOY! We worship with joy. We engage with each other with joy. We give with joy. We serve (most of the time, anyway) with joy.

Which brings us to a request of the parish. No doubt in part because of its "quality" and its joy, we continue to see visitors in worship each week. Please do your parts, along with Wardens and Vestry and Rector, to reach out to them with welcome. Our meaningful worship can attract people to St. Andrew's, but it is likely it is our joyful community (that's YOU!) — and more on that coming from the retreat later — that will lead them to become a part of our parish. Thanks for doing your part.
