Jay's Say: Mindful of God

Encouraged by research that

shows its efficacy in reducing stress and anxiety, my sister-in-law has undertaken a two-year training program in Mindfulness Meditation. Kathleen's counseling practice on the Seacoast has prompted me to reflect on Christian mindfulness.

Mindfulness is nonjudgmental awareness of experience as it unfolds, moment by moment. We exercise the "muscle" of our attention in order to focus on the only moment over which we have control — right now.

Jesus says, "I have come that you might have life, and might have it in all its fullness" (John 10.10). Might we embrace God's promise of abundant life by being fully present in each moment? Instead of hoping that something better will come along, can we accept our experience right now as a gift from God?

Jesus consistently encourages us to be attentive to our hearts and minds, to set aside our attachment to ourselves, and to live in the awareness of God's moment-to-moment provision.

In the Christian culture of the West, spending time with God has often meant "devotions" and studying scripture. Mindfulness meditation provides another route that coheres with how healthy relationships work -simply spending time with God. In everyday life, mindfulness is the practice of praying without ceasing (1 Thessalonians 5.16) — being with God during each moment of our day.

Mindfulness is often regarded as a Buddhist practice, but Christians can use this tool to deepen spiritual maturity and improve mental health. In my experience, mindfulness can open us to God's healing presence.

This is truly God's work that the St. Andrew's BA team is about. I think of several Bible passages that speak in support of this assertion:

Get along with each other, and forgive each other. If someone does wrong to you, forgive that person because the Lord forgave you. -- Colossians 3:13

But I say to you, love your enemies. Pray for those who hurt you. -- Matthew 5:44

Do not do wrong to repay a wrong, and do not insult to repay an insult. But repay with a blessing, because you yourselves were called to do this so that you might receive a blessing. The Scripture says, "A person must do these things to enjoy life and have many happy days. He must not say evil things, and he must not tell lies; ..." -- 1 Peter 3:9-10

Do not be bitter or angry or mad. Never shout angrily or say things to hurt others. Never do anything evil. Be kind and loving to each other, and forgive each other just as God forgave you in Christ. -- Ephesians 4:31-32

It is no accident that these ancient writings from the Bible speak authoritatively to today's social strife. People have always sinned and sought means to atonement. Life in Christ is the way that many of us find forgiveness and peace of mind. Showing patience and love toward our neighbors and toward those with whom we do not share a common view is essential to living Christ's greatest command – "Love one another." Learning the skills to hear opposing views with love and compassion, with understanding and charity, is fundamental to accepting each other as the flawed sinners we all are.

Last Sunday Looks Ahead – 24 September Handmaids Catholic Clinic and Maternity

Our September Last Sunday Outreach Offering supports the Handmaids Catholic Clinic and Maternity located in Pendembu, Sierra Leone in West Africa. Pendembu is in a remote area far inland from the Atlantic Coast and near the border with Liberia. When St. Andrew's parishioner Dr. Tom Adamski travels to help at the clinic, it takes him three full days to get there. Tom first visited the clinic when he was training medical students at West Virginia University. Over the past decade, Tom has returned to the clinic at least annually (except during Covid and the African Ebola outbreak). He typically goes in January and stays for 4-6 weeks, serving as the only doctor the clinic knows. Tom also provides pharmaceuticals, medical supplies, and desperately needed personal financial backing.

The clinic was established in 1979 by the Hand-

maids of Jesus order of nuns. You may recall that Sister Anthonia from the clinic addressed the congregation at a 10 a.m. service in July. The clinic offers 24/7 service (even though there are only two care providers). It provides vital immunizations for children under five. The clinic treats and supports pregnant mothers, who typically are badly malnourished. The clinic also helps the community battle malaria by providing medications for treatment and supportive inpatient care.

The clinic requires \$23,000 per year to operate, which includes salaries. This money comes from the small fees charged to patients and from donations. Patients struggle to pay the fees. The clinic also badly needs additional funds for improvements to its equipment, such as a surgical suite, incubators, oxygen, IV equipment, sterilizers, and patient monitors. Please consider supporting this worthy cause through our Outreach and helping Tom further his personal mission with the people of Pendembu. – *Jim Mathias*

Last Sunday Looks Ahead – **29 October** El Hogar

The recipient of our Last Sunday donations in October will once again be El Hogar, the school in Honduras that is so much more than a school. El Hogar provides a loving and supportive home for children living in the poorest conditions and a second family for those day students who can live at home. These children are given hope for a better future and confidence to become future leaders of Honduras.

Since we reported on El Hogar last October, 12th graders celebrated their graduation (November) and a new school year began (February). With a spotlight on health, the public health department was invited to join in a health fair at the school at the beginning of the school year. A public health microbiologist had spent his elementary school years at El Hogar and was pleased to be able to give back to the school that had done so much for him. The children were given physical exams, they learned about nutrition, and received needed medications. This is one of the partnerships that El Hogar finds vital to its efforts to care for the whole child.

El Hogar has its own dental suite that was donated by an American dentist and is staffed by a visionary Honduran dentist. Doctora Nora provides dental care to students and their families. This year, she established a dental assistant course – a first in Honduras – and looks forward to partnering with local dentists to improve dental care in Honduras and to providing the 12th grade girls with a chance to sample an occupation in the health field.

El Hogar was founded in 1979 as a mission of the Episcopal church with just a few orphan boys who had been living on the streets. After providing elementary education for many years, it has grown into a full 1st through 12th grade school with more than 200 students on two campuses. In the three years since 12th grade was added, 28 students have graduated and 20 of those are either working or pursuing higher education. Ten more will graduate this fall.

El Hogar is on a continuous quest to improve and expand its service to the well-being of Honduran children. Last year, the school raised funds to provide a more home-like atmosphere for the elementary age students who live at the school while also supporting the family relationships of those living at home. This year, a priority will be to purchase new furniture for the living spaces of the high school students, most of whom live on campus at the Instituto Tecnico Santa Maria (the high school). By giving generously in October, we may be able to help the school finish that project.

Wardens' Words

September of 2023 is a special time in the life of St. Andrew's! We celebrate that our rector, the Reverend Jay MacLeod, has been with us for ten years after spending many years serving the Anglican church in England. Our time with Jay has been filled with rich experiences that enlivened and fostered faith development; broadened outreach to those in need; connected us with other groups and organizations in our community, nation, and the world; and provided ways for us to live out our Christian identity as individuals and as a community.

We want to thank Jay heartily for his ministry at St. Andrew's during the last ten years. In recognition of Jay's ministry to St. Andrew's, we would like to review **some** of the many contributions that Jay has made to our faith community.

- Jay is committed to providing us with meaningful liturgical experiences. There have been services suitable for all ages and a unique service on top of Mount Sunapee during the winter. Messy Church – with its goal of including children and a wider community population – has made for some exciting gatherings in the parish hall and the sanctuary. Prayer services are a regular part of our church calendar, and this has included midday prayer, time for meditation, a weekly healing service, and on occasion a Taizé/compline service.
- During the last ten years there have been several pilgrimages that have enriched the lives of all who participated. Pilgrims have traveled, prayed, and learned in many places including Iona in Scotland, the Holy sites of Israel/Palestine/Jordan, and to Navajoland here in the United States.
- Through the focus of our Outreach Commission, searching for appropriate recipients, St. Andrew's has provided an admirable service to those in need locally, nationally, and internationally.
- Jay developed lay ministers to serve our faith community including Eucharistic Visitors who share in his ministry to those who are homebound, ill, or dying.
- As always, Jay is committed to faith development and has either taught classes or arranged experts as speakers. These classes broadened knowledge and understanding of our faith.
- Jay has been committed to the wider Episcopal Church, serving on committees, and acting as a mentor to individuals either working towards ordination or who are new to ministry. In a highly successful development, we enjoyed a warm partnership with two interns from Voorhees University this summer.
- Programs such as Dodge, Drum and Sing, and two summer camps for children were

initiated under Jay's leadership. Jay introduced us to Phillips Brooks and we have hosted children from Boston for several years.

• Fostering relationship, and building and creating a joyfilled community has been an important part of Jay's ministry at St. Andrew's. This has included the Men's Breakfast, luncheons for parishioners over the age of 80, weekly cookouts during the summer months, participation in the Hospital Day Parade, leading a cricket game for all in the diocese (*below*), and his own fun participation in the summer fair where he allows himself to be dunked continuously (*right*)!



Jay has been a good and faithful servant at St. Andrew's.
